The concept of justice is central to the work of judges not only because of the roles judges play in administering justice but also because of the roles judicial decision-making plays in shaping the social, economic and political lives of citizens and the social, economic, and political structures that engender just and orderly societies. The 5th Annual Political Economy and Access to Justice Judicial Education Seminar brings the concept of justice and the varying functions of judicial-decision-making into relief to contemplate what happens when these functions fail or are at risk of failing in a constitutional republic.
